#### Dear members

Minutes of Northern Turners General Meeting June 25 2022

The meeting was presided by the president - Tim Smeaton Attendance: approximately 55 members Apologies: Christine Deguet, Barry Brinkley

President: Tim asked members to indicate by a show of hands that the minutes of the last meeting be accepted. This was carried.

Treasurer: The treasurer reported a balance of \$27388 at the end of May.

Exhibition Committee Graham Reed told us that sales at the Home Show were good even though the Friday had low attendance. Total sales were \$7580 and the club made a small profit.

Maintenance Jeff Todd asked members to let him know if any faults are discovered on the school lathes.

Website Gordon Best said there was nothing to report.

Biggest Morning Tea Tim announced that the Biggest Morning Tea raised \$3407 for the Cancer Council, noting that this was good, given that the number of attendees was lower than in past years.

President Tim asked members to please consider becoming more involved in the club. The treasurer and secretary need to have an assistant, and with the increasing complexity of technology, there is a need for more expertise to relieve Robert Edge and others. Members are asked to offer their services. He also said that we may start a roster system for setting up before meeting and cleaning up and closing the venue.

# 3RD SATURDAY DEMONSTRATION

### GEORGE PASTUCH—END GRAIN BOWL

The session started with George explaining the differences when turning a bowl from an end grain blank.

- Retaining the bark or natural edge. To achieve this the bowl's design is an ogee shape. Otherwise the bark or natural edge would be removed.
- The blank should be relatively circular in shape. If the diameter is very irregular, the top part of the ogee must be elongated to ensure the rim is the same thickness all round.
- When turning both the inside and outside of the bowl, the direction of the cut is opposite to a standard bowl. This will ensure cutting 'down hill' and minimize tear out.





George completed the demonstration by turning a bowl while explaining the basics of turning a bowl and highlighting the down hill cut.

NOTE: Begin turning the inside of the bowl from outside towards the centre and finish the rim. Do not cut again as the bark may be lost especially if cutting towards the rim.

When turning the inside of the bowl, discussion revolved around the methods to achieve this. These included the following:-

- Drilling a hole using a forstner drill bit to remove the majority of waste.
- Use a scraper
- Use a bowl gouge ensuring the last few cuts are from the centre out.
- Use a cup tool
- Use a hook tool.

Several members turned their own end grain bowls after the completion of the demonstration.

## 4th SATURDAY DEMONSTRATION—BILL ELLIOT—FRUIT

Bill Elliott demonstrated his method of turning an apple and a pear.

He started with a piece of timber long enough to produce an apple and a pear. It was turned to a cylinder and tenons were turned on both ends for holding in a chuck and the pieces were then parted in the middle.

One piece was then placed in a chuck, slightly off centre since he pointed out that apples are seldom symmetrical. The bottom was then shaped with a small bowl gouge and the indentation in the bottom was done with a small detail gouge.

A hole is then drilled in this indentation to accept the screw from a home-made screw chuck, which was simply a piece of wood to fit in the chuck with a screw through the middle, projecting about 40mm.

The piece was then screwed onto the screw chuck and the top completed, making an indentation deeper than the one on the bottom. A small hole is then drilled to take the stem.

Bill then followed the same procedure to turn the pear.

He then used a base coat of yellow water-based dye. Once dry, this can be followed by spraying on some red dye to achieve the desired effect (assuming you want a red apple).

Bill then said that you can glue a clove in the bottom and cut or turn a stem which is glued into the top hole.
