

Leith Davidson, displayed a Platter the timber was unknown.

Allan Plunket, Mahogany bowls large and small.

# <u>Saturday June 23rd</u>

Once again I point out we do not advertise / endorse products in this newsletter. Ron gave a fascinating demonstration on the use of resin inlays, primarily in box lids, although discussion was held on using on bowl and platter rims. I will say that the product used was Solid Cast but that there are many others some cheaper some dearer. It became clear that no matter which product you use there are a couple of things to get right, measuring and stirring. Make sure your quantities are correct and stir slowly with a flat stick. The major thing to avoid is air bubbles. Colour can be added to the resin or kept clear and have objects imbedded. Objects shown were flat earrings which

looked very specky, plant life, leaves and buds and shells. You can also use coins metal shavings basically anything. After the demo a couple of members had a go and we look forward to seeing the results. On July28th we will be mixing up a batch for people to use first thing in the morning 0930 so that hopefully it is set when the member goes home.

Finishing the product i.e. sanding is a bit of an art also. Wet and dry appears to be the way to go and working through the grits is essential.

Next Month (JULY) we have a fun day for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday, which is strange cos I thought we always had fun? On the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday Bill Elliott wil be making some lovely little coloured bowls/cups

We have two more events occurring before our next club meetings.

Workplace safety seems to be coming to the fore especially through the eyes of our insurers.

We will need to look closely at all aspects of what we do within our club and especially when turning. The committee will be taking a closer look at these issues so watch this space. In the meantime I would suggest the following to be the minimal requirements for members at our meetings.

- 1. Closed in shoes, no open sandals or thongs.
- 2. Eye protection when using lathes or bandsaw.
- 3. Full face shield when turning unstable timber.
- 4. Adherence to product instructions when using any forms of chemicals

In the future in a worst case scenario it may be necessary to enforce stricter requirements in relation to

PPE (personal protective equipment) SOP ( standard operating procedures) MSDS (material safety data sheets)

Mostly it comes down to a lot of common sense and sensible work practices

#### **Exhibition open** – Saturday September 8<sup>th</sup> to Sunday September 23rd 2012

**Entry forms** – should be received by Wednesday August 29<sup>th</sup>, 2012. Entry forms should be emailed to Ron Allen. Early receipt of entries will help us with our preparation. Do not send entry fees at this stage. **Delivery of Exhibits.** All exhibits must be delivered to the Exhibition site between 11.00 am and 2.00 pm on Friday September 7<sup>th</sup> or by other pre-arranged methods. All exhibits must be accompanied by a written descriptor and the entry fees. Descriptor format has been simplified and a template in MS Word format will be provided separately.

<u>Collection of unsold exhibits</u>. Between (NOT BEFORE) 4.00pm and 4.30pm on Sunday September 23<sup>rd</sup> or 9.00 to 10.00am on Monday September 24<sup>th</sup>, or by other prior written arrangements.

#### **CONDITIONS FOR EXHIBITING**

- 1. An entry fee of \$3 per item will be charged. Exhibitors will be permitted to submit up to 10 entries. However exhibition space is limited and if necessary we may need to reduce entries.
- 2. The Organising Committee reserves the right to exclude any entry from the Exhibition. Reasons for any exclusion will be given and entry fees refunded.
- 3. Successful artists may replace sold pieces during the exhibition. There will not be a fee for these replacement items.
- 4. Expenses incurred in the delivery and return of exhibits are to be the responsibility of exhibitors.
- 5. Whilst the Exhibition will be supervised, all items for exhibition are displayed and stored at exhibitors' risk. If entrants wish to insure their exhibit against theft or damage, it is their responsibility to take out the relevant insurance cover.
- 6. The Northern Turners reserves the right to use any exhibit for publicity by any media for the duration of the Exhibition and for any review of the Exhibition
- 7. All exhibitors are expected to be rostered for a supervision time slot. Details later
- 8. The minimum price for any exhibit for sale is \$50
- 9. The Port Adelaide Community Arts Centre will receive a 15% commission on all sales. Please ensure that your selling price includes the commission.

<u>**CRAFT TABLE</u>** We will have a craft table again this year.</u>

#### 1 Items in the craft category should not compete with exhibition entries

- 1. One of the major aims is to allow well made articles which do not fit the exhibition criteria to be offered for sale. Another aim was to allow newer members to offer small pieces for sale as a possible introduction for future exhibition work.
- 2. Exhibitors are able to display for sale up to 5 items on the craft table
- 3. Craft items must be accompanied by an attached swing tag and an entry fee of \$1.
- 4. Craft items must be priced between \$10 and \$40. The Port Adelaide Community Arts Centre will receive a 15% commission on all sales. Please ensure that your selling price includes the commission
- 5. Some ideas of items suitable might include the following:
  - a. Small bowls of less than 150 mm, including small potpourris, small lidded boxes, small weed pots or bud vases, Mushrooms, Pens, pensets etc., Cheese knives, Needle cases and other sundry ornamental items
