On June 22nd Brian Purcell will be demonstrating how to make a Gavel and Sounding Block.

We would like to see you all on the lathes so YOU will need to bring the following, and YOU have plenty of time to organise yourselves.

Timber required is any, preferably, Hardwood.

Gavel head 60mm square by 150mm long

Gavel Handle 35mm square by 300mm long

Sounding Board roughly 120mm diameter by 50mm thick

Turning tools, sandpaper, polishes/finishes, 16 ml spade bit and callipers.

## NORTHERN TURNERS - 20 YEARS OF

I knew that we would be celebrating our 20<sup>th</sup> year in 2013, but always thought that it was due to happen in November. However, when searching through my archival material, realised that we should have celebrated the occasion in February, in fact our first workshop meeting was held on Saturday Feb. 13<sup>th</sup> 1993.

It all began in late 1992 when three members of the South Australian Woodgroup Inc. (as it was then known), Dick Pillar, Andy Smylie and Alf Woolley approached me about using the Golden Grove HS Workshops to hold meetings of a new group. I was then the Campus Coordinator of Tech Studies and welcomed the idea. I had known Dick for a number of years – he was a fellow "Senior Master" in Tech Studies. With the support of the Tree Gully Council a public meeting was held on February 9<sup>th</sup>, which was attended by more than 70 interested woodturning people. A horticulturist from the Council addressed the meeting and outlined the programme of removing feral trees like the Olive from council controlled land – mainly linear parks. Many of us acquired some very old olive wood through this process, in fact I still have a few pieces.

Below are some extracts from a report of our first workshop (Feb 13<sup>th</sup>) in the Woodgroup Newsletter (Feb 93) written by Dick Pillar.

"A most rewarding day. Attendance was in the vicinity of 40 by the time it was necessary to bring the proceedings to an end"

"Activities for the day centred around lathes operated by Neville Sanders, Bruce Elix and Dick Pillar".

"The planned meeting for the next workshop on February 27<sup>th</sup> is Chucks – any variety, wooden, homemade or commercial".

The names of some of those mentioned above will only have significance to the long time members but none the less will help to create some reminiscences from the past.

The next report is from the March Newsletter, again reported by Dick Pillar. Included in this report is a photo of the meeting held in the GGHS workshop which shows a much younger group of familiar faces, including Roger Humphris (in his traditional overalls), Graham Hawkins, Ron Allen and Brian Fraser. Some extracts from the report include:-

"The morning resulted in a host of chucks being displayed"

"One fellow even had them coming from his pockets". Any guesses who that may have been.

"In the afternoon a host of lathes became available"

"Ron Barber was elated to be able to go home after the day with his first bowl"

Over the next few months I will continue with similar articles. In the meantime you may be able to collect some photos or similar memorabilia which we can display at a later meeting.

## SCROLL SAW AND THE LATHE



I was asked to do a summary on my talk regarding The Scroll Saw and The Lathe.

The scroll saw can be looked upon as a legitimate adjunct to the lathe, similar to pyography, the dremel and carving.

Firstly, I addressed purchasing a saw.

A Hegner 18" scroll saw is considered the "Rolls Royce" of saws, but are rather expensive, a few dollars short of \$2,000. There is, however, a "look alike" called Carbatec which costs about \$600 and has proved to be quite popular.

I suggested that the features on the saw should be

- the saw takes pinless blades pinless blades only require a small hole to be drilled to thread the blade for internal cuts. A pin type blade needs a larger hole.
- a variable speed facility (700 1500 spm) is a distinct advantage when cutting different materials, eg wood, steel, brass, perspex, etc.

The different types of blades available are standard, double tooth, skip tooth, reverse tooth and spiral blades. They come in various sizes, ranging from 2/0, 0, 1, 2 ............ 11 and 12.

Most of my cutting is done with blade sizes 3, 5, 7 and 9.

I gave a tip regarding cutting materials that have a tendency to burn, eg blackwood. Obviously adjusting the speed of the blade helps. If burning still persists, cover the pattern (which is glued to the wood) with clear cellotape. The cellotape will lubricate the blade, reduce burning and still allow you to scroll to the pattern.

I then spoke about some of the techniques that I believe can be used in conjunction with wood turning.

- any item that is flat, such as pendants, can be placed on the scroll saw and cut in a decorative manner.
- 3D cutting (third dimensional cutting) can be used to cut decorations to be placed, for example, on top of a turned trinket box.
- a fretwork overlay could similarly be glued onto any reasonably flat surface.
- a sculptured item cut out, shaped and attached to a turned object can be very effective. One of my successes was a little gecko shaped to fit the inside curvature of a small bowl with its head looking out over the rim. This took the fancy of a buyer.
- flawless inlaying is a technique where an inlaid piece of wood (often contrasting colour) is attached underneath the main piece of wood and the scroll saw table tilted to the left about 3°. The pattern is cut in an anticlockwise direction. On completion, the top piece of wood falls out and is replaced by the inlaid wood flawlessly fitting into the gap. This makes a most attractive insert for the lid of a turned box.
- wedged inlaying is similar, except it is mainly done in one piece of wood and the scroll saw table is set at a greater angle. The result is that, when the pattern is cut, it can be pressed up and wedged into place as a protruding pattern. You may then like to shape it, perhaps using a dremel. The result is usually a most attractive lid insert for a turned box. This technique was demonstrated on the day.
