The process will be discussed ,not demonstrated, at 1000am and then in to it. When you are at the stage to use the texturing tool there will be others who can assist you.




# There is no excuse for not giving it a go even if you have only limited experience.

## STRAIGHT FROM THE TIN

Robert Swanney, was a director of Shipway Spescoat, retailers of specialised paints and timber finishing products.

He spoke on paint products and their application. Here are some of the points he made.

He may well have startled some members with his very first rule on how to overcome potential painting problems, ie.

All paint products MUST be stirred thoroughly and regularly during application.

He outlined the various reasons why paints fail due to lack of this fundamental requirement.

Driers. accelerators and pigments can and do settle at the bottom of containers and, if not properly mixed, will cause all manner of troubles – paint failing to dry, failing to run well (brush marks). failing to cover, uneven coating, and so on.

It is best, he said, to use a flat, square-ended stirring stick to ensure all sediment is moved.

Small quantities of coatings should be transferred into a small container and the large tin sealed again prior to application. This helps preserve the product.

**Cold air temperatures** and surfaces {below 10°C) do not allow paint to cure. Surfaces of following coats may delaminate and fail to adhere.

**Hot surfaces** also cause problems and can produce blistering, wrinkling, etc. due to trapped solvents between drying coats.

**Sanding** can produce problems but steel wool fibres are worse. Lost fibres can cause "flash" rust in the coating.

Dust on the surface: – When dust particles are coated, they grow larger and the surface becomes rough so use a rag soaked in solvent or a tack rag to remove the dust before application of paint.

Clear finishes may have dryers at the bottom and they also need stirring.

**High-density rollers** are good for producing a smooth finish with gloss paints and varnishes. Additives are available to control drying and flow, also mould checks.

Weathered, old or tannin and rust-stained timber can be cleaned with l'Imberclean", an oxalic acid-based product which also removes oil stains.

**Timber preservatives:** - "Deep Treat" water repellent, as its name implies, deeply penetrates into timber and stops water penetrating and residual moisture escaping.

**Epoxies:** – only recommended for use in aggressive environments.

**Urethane-based Danish oil** is used to finish all interior timbers and can go .on over any sealer. However, shelf-life may limit its future use as it goes off in the can Oellies).

To assist in smoothing out coatings on large surfaces, he recommended Penetrol Flood.

Water-based products are not yet as good as they will get. (not sure when this written Ed.)

Cabot's Hydra Clear is popular. This product does not level out as well as solvent-based paints, does not bring out the colour of timber and can raise the grain. However, it is faster drying than solvent-

Requirements for chess set demonstration

Close-grained wood, approx. 100-120mm long x 35-40mm wide.

Since the size of the chess men is variable, you can choose either smaller or larger pieces.

I will bring in some bits to try your hand.

I used jacaranda for my set, and stained half of them. You may like to use contrasting timbers.

Since this is my first demonstration to Northern Turners, be kind!!

**Staining:** - Oil, pigment or spirit stains can be blotchy. Washing the surface with methylated spirits allows for more even staining.

Products are available to grain MDF and similar products to look like timber or fleckstone or other grain finishes.

Sikkens Codrln provides an undercoat for a final mirror finish.

**Polyfilla**. absorbs moisture through deteriorating or poorly applied paint and will swell, rupturing the surface. It should not be used externally.

Sales of goods will still attract a 10% commission to the Woodgroup but the Northern Turners were invited to use this opportunity to raise some money for their own needs.

As with last years event a table with Acacia carnie and possibly some Western Myall will be available for sale with proceeds going to the SA Woodgroup Timber a/c.

There will also be available an selection of good quality pen blanks in an assortment of native species available at \$2 each"


