I would like to thank Edward Noah for volunteering to put all our Videocassettes from the library onto DVD. Not only will members be more likely to borrow them but they will take up less room.



### **Second Saturday Soliloquy**

### Meeting 13th July



Lots of lathes on the go and some pretty interesting results, especially from those giving it a go for the first time.

There was a lot of interest in the different types of coloring available especially Bills black stuff.

The base was a black powder used in French Polishing mixed with metholated spirits.

Smelt good, sort of like a Black Russian.

The texturing tools were put to

good use with differing results. Some coarse some fine but all different which is really the idea. Bill was also using some silver paint on top of the black which gave a very interesting effect..



# Next Meeting 10th August

Whilst some want to continue with their texturing and that is fine others will move on to Hollowed Forms.

What is a Hollow Form?

Not sure myself but I would describe it as a vessel where the neck is narrower than the widest part of the hollow.

I think we can look at two types, single shell and joined shell. Pictures are not to scale but you can

see one is made in 2 parts and then joined with a clever disguise

The finished project should look like one of these or at least similar or have some vague resemblance

You will need timber of choice. Finished size can be about 100mm around the guts and 200mm high or whatever you like, for instance the 2 part form can be squashed down to 100mm x 100mm. Tools of your choice but a hollowing tool will be an advantage. A Jacobs chuck and drills.

Sandpaper and finish of course.

The teardrop vase is obviously the less technically demanding of the two but care will be needed to get the wall thickness

right because it will be 'visible' to others. The onion shape is made in 2 parts the most difficult exercise will be to create a join which is almost invisible. Of course you don't have to stop at the basic shell. These forms lend themselves well to all forms of embellishment.

You are limited only by your imagination!


