April 3rd Saturday Meeting

Say hello to the skew chisel. The day had one rule. Only the skew chisel could be used. George Pastuch started the day talking about different shape skew chisels, and grinding them. Next was demonstrating roughing a piece of pine to a cylinder, turning beads, then making a spirtle and a spatula. The day then belonged to everyone to have a go. It was great to see some new members and current members putting their hands to it. End result was very satisfying. Everybody had a go and succeeded without any real mishaps.



May 3rd Saturday Meeting

Introduction to bowl turning was the topic for the day. George Pastuch led a very precise if not too lengthy a discussion on bowl gouges, bowl design, and grinding bowl gouges. Followed by a practical demonstration on turning a basic bowl. Again most members attending started turning. Many thanks to Bill Elliot and Glen Kutchen for providing hands on help while George spent most of the day re-sharpening tools for people.



April 4th Saturday Meeting

Show and Tell was disappointingly small in numbers but interesting. Refer the pictures below. To support the previous demo from Ron Allen were 3 hollow eggs!



The demo was by George Pastuch which was focused on split turning. There was some discussion as to what he was making and it was later identified as Streptohedrons which consisted of turning a shape between centres from two pieces glued with a paper joint then split apart and rejoining in a different profile. A more comprehensive article will be forwarded to members through our secretary in the next week or so.

A visit to a Tinker's Shed

On Thursday 27th March, after several months to organize, 4 members of Northern Turners, Graham Reed, Bill Elliot, Paul Beebee and Tony Davies were invited to show members of the Nuriootpa Tinker's Shed how to use the lathes that they have in their workshop. ("Mens Shed" called Tinker's Shed to encourage women to be part of the organisation) The premises that they have are excellent, and have had huge support from businesses and individuals to get this organization up and running. We had 10 people attend to see what we had to offer, in the way of advice and techniques on how to use a lathe.

Paul spoke on the care of the lathe, chucks and the different jaws that were available. Tony spoke on sharpening and the different jigs that could be used. Bill gave a demo on how to make a garden dibber. The idea was to show the guys something that could be made fairly quickly so they could get on the lathes . During the course of the day everybody spent time making shavings, some who had never done any turning before or had not done anything for many years had a go, and they all took something home at the end.

The people that attended were keen and enthusiastic and a great bunch of guys to boot. Lunch that was provided was really, really good and the apple strudel - well what can I say! We had a great day, they appreciated what we did for them, and they will remember Northern Turners - what more could you ask for?

Jimmy Clewes Workshop

From Woodgroup SA website

A very successful weekend was spent by Northern Turners and members from other woodworking clubs enjoying the repartee, technical expertise and design offered by Jimmy Clewes who came to Australia as a result of co-operation between clubs in several States. Tim Skilton was the force behind getting Jimmy to come and with Greg Jackson's help we were able to see him producing a number of elegant pieces.

Among these were an Asian style square lidded box with wings (red gum), a box with inlaid lid with a gilded ring around the inlay (blackheart sassafras with walnut inlay), a platter (ash), a natural edge vase (yellow-wood), a lidded box (Australian cedar with Huon pine lid), as well as a quirky goblet which would hold a very small tot of your favourite tipple on an extremely delicate stem. One of the features of this demonstrator was the fine finish on his pieces, with suggestions such as use of shellac under oil finishes. It was clear from Jimmy's presentation that he has taught a great deal, and has given thought to almost every aspect of turning, especially the different tool grinds, angles of presentation, and the different cuts possible. He emphasised that it didn't matter which tools or approaches you used, if you produced a good result, that was the important thing. After all, the purchasers are not wood-turners! With the usual good lunches provided by the caterers, a successful raffle of the prizes donated by Carba-Tec and Leda, and auction of the pieces at the end of the workshop, everyone had a great time and went away with new ideas. Hopefully we will see the results at the next Show and Tell.

Comments from George Pastuch

There are several specific items I would like to add to the summary on the Woodgroup SA website.

Although fundamentally self taught, his tool skills were incredible. He emphasised that one would only need a few tools and demonstrated this by conducting the whole weekend using 3 different size and grind bowl gouges, parting tool, skew chisel and his box scraper. His explanation of push and pull cuts were easy to follow.

He enlightened us with his simple method of inserting a brass line around an insert in the lid of a turned box.

Although there is wide variation regarding bowl shapes, Jimmy made it quite clear regarding his preferences and provided an easy way to make a graceful curve and elegant ogee curve which he demonstrated with his platter and end grain bowl. I will include these when I receive a drawing from Jimmy.
