CHAINSAW CARVING

I had read about chainsaw carving in an issue of The Australian Woodworker, but had never actually seen any in the flesh (wood).

While holidaying in Tasmania back in 2008, it came to our attention that there were some excellent examples of this art in a small town named Legerwood. My wife and I proceeded

to find out where Legerwood was and made our way there. Legerwood is situated approx. eight kilometres south of the main road, half way between Derby and Scottsdale.

When we reached the turn-off to Legerwood, there on the corner was a tall wooden figure, pointing towards Legerwood. (Photo 1). It appeared to be carved from the trunk of a tree. On closer inspection, it was clear that this was the case. Either living or dead.

After examination, we closed our mouths and drove

into Legerwood. What confronted us was, at the time, quite unbelievable.

There all in a line, were nine other carvings, all carved in the same manner as the first. We were led to believe that the trees had died and this is what was done with them.

Upon further examination, it was noted that each and every tree had been planted on the 15th of October 1918, in memory of all those fallen during the 14-18 conflict. Whether the trees died or not I did no ascertain for sure,



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But what a way to celebrate the memory of those who fell.

The Carvings were not all carved from a single trunk, as in photo 1, but from some of the lower branches as well, as in photo 2.

We examined each carving and photographed each one, including plaques and write-ups for each carving, sample in photo 3.



Space does not permit me to reproduce all 24 photos that we took, but I must include the one of the "clone of the original Lone Pine from Gallipoli", planted in memory of <u>all</u> those who fell during the 14-18 conflict. (Photo 4)



All the carvings were done by a Mr. Eddie G Freeman, and, so I believe, using only a chainsaw.

The carvings were begun in December of 2004 and completed in April of 2007.

There is one other chain-sawn figure that we learnt about and it was situated in Scottsdale near the RSL hall and was done in memory of soldiers in the Viet-nam conflict.

This tree in Photo 5 was, I believe, a Eucalypt, but which one I do not know. As for the trees in Legerwood, I have since been informed by Mr. Kevin Rundle of the Scrollers, who was in Tasmania after we were, that they were Macrocarpa Pine.

The highlight of our visit to Tasmania, very close to the top of our list.

MEMBER PROFILE—Anne Kerr

What part of Adelaide are you from? I live in Salisbury East

What was or is your occupation and background? During my working life I was an office worker but have been retired for many years. My last job was at Fremont High School

How did you get into woodturning? I have always been interested in woodwork. First I enrolled for a term in Tafe in general woodwork

During which time I learnt to use power tools, learnt to make basic joints and learnt the valuable lesson that absolute accuracy is necessary when measuring! I later saw some examples of woodcarving which I found interesting, so I took some lessons in carving. I stuck with this for about 10 years until a chance came along for a hands-on turning session with a friend in Victoria. I left my friend's workshop totally "hooked".

How long have you been woodturning? I started turning in 1986 when I enrolled for a term at Gilles Plains tafe What Lathes do you current use? I have just one lathe which is a Vic Mark 200 which I bought new in 1997. It does not have variable speed but is just a beautiful machine and a joy to use. I started off in my early days with a BEAM (Blackwood engineering)

I had this for many years, until I felt I was ready for something better. This was a sturdy lathe but to use Tim Skilton's words was "rather agricultural".

What is your dream lathe? I have it!

What was the first thing you turned? The first thing I turned was a honey dipper (don't we all) but I certainly don't still have it!

What is your favourite kind of turning? I turn almost exclusively spindles. I love the shapes and forms. I love the design process and the challenge when making a "pair-of" or 4 matching parts. I rarely turn anything without first drawing up my plans, mostly to full size so I see my ideas really work. That way I don't waste too much timber!.

What do you find the most challenging to turn? Probably deep hollow vessels provide the biggest challenge. However I have had invaluable help from mates in the club and this process does not hold such fears for me now.

What type of timber do you like turning most? Without doubt Blackwood is my favourite timber. It is now getting very expensive to buy, but I do have a small stock awaiting a special project

What is your favourite part of your workshop? Standing behind my lathe!

What do you like best about Northern Turners meeting? I am a founding member of N.T. I am very proud of what we have achieved and how we have developed over the years, so I suppose I like every part of our meetings

What is your favourite piece and do you still have it? My favourite piece would be my rocking chair. This is the 3rd one I have made – the other 2 having sold at exhibitions. I really enjoy making chairs and the rocking chair was not particularly difficult but very exacting. (It is actually not a very comfortable chair, rather a decorative item)

Describe your workshop My workshop is actually half of our double garage. I can walk into it from the passage in the house which is so very convenient. Although it is not large I have everything close to hand and I move the car outside if I am assembling a large project which requires more room.
