




She than acknowledged some of the founding/early members of Northern Turners such as Anne Kerr, Graham Hawkins, Mal Warneke, Andy Smylie, Ron Adam, Roger Humphris.

Ken Allen then presented a history of the club prepared by Ron Allen. This covered the early history of Woodgroup, explaining how Northern Turners became a special interest group where all the members were direct members of Woodgroup. This changed in 2007 when Woodgroup was reorganised so that the various clubs are the members of Woodgroup and individuals are members of the various clubs.

Kevin Knight (Mayor of TTG) was then asked to say a few words. He first acknowledged the presence of Tony Zapia and Frances





Gordon Best was then called upon to say a few words about Dick Pillar. He noted that Dick Pillar, one of our founding members, could be considered the father of Northern Turners. He noted that Dick was a busy man writing many articles for the Woodgroup newsletter, demonstrating various turning techniques etc. He reminded members that Dick's family made a donation to the club after his death, with which we purchased our audio-visual equipment. He then presented his daughter with an eight page write up about Dick.

The next item was the selection of the winner of the Silver themed piece. Tim showed members the trophy made by Enzo Bronzi to be given to the winner. Enzo then said a few words, after which Tony Zapia was called on to decide the winner.

Tony said a few words, first acknowledging the mayor and Frances Bedford. He then said that the appreciation to craftsmanship shown in our work, noting that society has largely lost the ability to make things by hand. He gave his congratulations on our 25 years and thanked us for supporting local charities. He noted that any one of the items he inspected would hold their place in any display of fine woodwork. Finally, he announced the winner – Jeff Todd, for his hollow form with imbedded aluminium highlights, complete with silver flowers.

Demonstration

Later a demonstration was given by Dave Gilland, who showed various examples of three-sided shapes which are turned parallel to the lathe bed. He then showed how to turn a piece perpendicular to the bed, using a jig to hold the piece.

Mike St Clair

Mike St Clair is an exponent of contemporary woodturning. He creates one-of-a-kind sculptural vessels and artistic forms from Australian timbers.

He has travelled extensively to collect and then season many of this country's rare and coloured grained woods (coolabah, red, grey and white box, fibrous zanthorhoea, also known as grass tree or blackboy, pine, & myrtle) His most recognised work is in red river gum burls, where he exploits the natural grain edge or rim, often incorporating gold-leaf and ebonising.

Bruce Bell 2004

Bruce Bell, an apprentice carpenter and joiner in 1967, commenced woodturning as a hobby in 1973.

As his fascination with the craft continued over the years and the experience gained from working with Australia's outback timbers, Bruce decided to follow his dream and devote his time and talent to become one of Australia's leading woodturners.

Over a period of time Bruce has crafted an extensive range of unique items, for the Australian and overseas market. State and local Governments have purchased some as gifts for visiting dignitaries.

Vic Wood 2005

Vic Wood is an Internationally famous woodturner and a trained teacher with qualifications in Cabinet Making, Woodturning, and a Fellowship Diploma of Gold and Silver-smithing.

He has taught in high schools to senior level in all areas of woodworking, and for 12 years was involved in training Secondary Art and Crafts student teachers in the major discipline of woodcraft.

Vic has been widely involved in all areas related to wood. He was the convener of the first National Woodworking Conference of Australia and the Inaugural President of the Victorian Woodworkers Association





Terry Martin 2007

Terry Martin is a writer as well as a woodworker. His career in woodwork grew out of a lifelong love of trees, something that began with his childhood experiences playing in the Australian bush.

He loves to make simple shapes based on classical work and enjoys breaking rules.

Contrast inspires him from light and dark, rough and smooth, simple and complex. He particularly likes to create intriguing 'peep'-views into the heart of the tree.

Terry Scott 2010

Terry Scott began as a hobbyist turner after organising to cut some firewood. He encountered a stern elderly gentleman while loading his Puriri tree earmarked for firewood onto a truck. The gent insisted "Firewood be damned! This makes excellent turning timber." Terry went to the next guild meeting and his addiction to woodturning began. Terry experiments with texture and color on artistic forms away from standard, conventional utilitarian pieces

"Is that made from wood?" is often posed due to the predominant use of techniques that disguise the natural appearance. Large, out of balance pieces are a specialty as he enjoys stretching the boundaries of his turning skill. Innovations include a range of thin walled, pierced and carved pieces, which are adorned by twists and spires.

Terry Baker 2010

Terry Baker is a professional turner and artist, turning since 1983 after 15 years teaching in Industrial Art.

Terry's works have been exhibited widely in Australia and overseas. He has won numerous awards and his beautiful wooden forms are represented in many public collections including the Power House Museum Contemporary Australian Art Craft Collection, The Artbank Collection of the Australian Government, the Fuller Craft Museum in the USA, and in many private collections internationally.

In 1995 he was awarded the Churchill Fellowship Award and has studied in the USA, Sweden and the UK.

Neil Turner Started turning at 19 on a home-made lathe using wood that was unearthed while tilling the soil. He developed an interest in producing more artistic pieces using the inspiration from his farming background.

His work reflects influences from his past and incorporates some elements of the present environment. Combining these ideas from past and present has proved challenging, as he continues to bear in mind they must compliment one another and maintain a balance with itself.

Jimmy is not your ordinary woodturner and presents with a strong British style, wit, creative mind and engaging personality with more than 25 years of experience in woodturning and woodworking.

Jimmy left school at 16 yrs and attained an apprenticeship in engineering, then furthered his studies by attending Manchester Polytechnic in Manchester, England receiving an Honours Degrees with emphasis on 3-Dimensional Design. He then specialized in designing and making furniture which was influenced by Japanese tools and design. Jimmy is in high demand for his services as a freelance demonstrator, online presenter (with his own You Tube channel) and teacher all over the world.

In 1968 Liam O'Neill began work as an apprentice production woodturner.

Liam still manufactures large-scale production work although an expert in woodturning techniques, he continues to express himself and experiment, while at the same time allowing nature always to dictate.

His interest has always been in the way in which he could use woodturning creatively to make unique sculptural pieces.

There are no embellishments, no ornate decorations in his work, only those nature intended. He uses the grain, the natural patina, the contours, the various arboreal qualities to his advantage, to give us the very essence of the wood.

Mick O'Donnell 2015

Michael O'Donnell, first started woodturning in 1970 and for the first 10 years undertook traditional wood turning making spinning wheels, spinning chairs, three legged stools, bread boards, and salad bowls. Badly affected by the dust produced Mick turned to and investigated turning green timber.

Recognised for his contribution to woodturning in general and sharpening in particular, he producing sharpening jigs and accessories (unfortunately no longer available).

Author of "Turning Green Wood" and "Decorating Turned Wood", and producer of videos such as "Turning Green Wood" and "Tool Sharpening for Results".

Neil Scobie 2009, 2015

Neil began his woodwork career, by training as an Industrial Arts Teacher in the early 1970 s, teaching in NSW high schools for twenty years.

The focus of his work changed, from predominantly woodturning in the early days to mostly custom made furniture. His furniture is much sort after and is found in homes throughout Australia, England and the US including the *'The Lodge'* the home of Australia's Prime Minister. and one off *'Art off the lathe pieces'*.

Richard Raffan 2006, 2016

Richard Raffan (born 1943) is a well-known woodturner, author, and instructor who has helped popularize the craft of woodturning since the 1970s. He was a part of the 'art turning' movement that saw turned objects move into galleries presented as works of art

Although he has created large and valuable works of exotic woods, in his books he has also championed simple utilitarian works created for daily use.

He finishes much of this work simply, using vegetable oil and beeswax, and has written admiringly of the patina of well used wooden items

Matthias Bachofan Beer 2017


Matthias Bachofen, born in Winterthur in 1964, graduated as a Woodturner in 1990. After working for several years in various companies in the wood sector, he now has his own business and Altelier (private workshop for an artist) in Switzerland with its own teaching & training facilities.

He produces articles for daily use such as salad bowls, pallets, candlesticks or nutcrackers as well as decorative and artistic objects.

His raw material is mainly local wood, often coming from parks or gardens, which he personally takes care of from the trunk conversion to the finished object.

Vaughn Richmond is a third generation Western Australia woody, and like many Australian school kids he first used a wood lathe at High School.

He is influenced by the Art Nouveau period, and embraces with enthusiasm the asymmetrical designs, organic natural shapes, and the sensual curves and lines of this period of Art.
