This will also incorporate a Come and try session.

If you have a scroll saw bring it along and members of Southern Scrollers will provide help and guidance on your own saw.

This will be followed by the Biggest Morning Tea and an auction. (All items gratefully accepted for the auction.)

4th Saturday Demonstrations - Ron Allen-turning spheres

Ron first talked about a video he watched which use a mathematical formula to turn a octagon and then then gradually into a sphere. He said he won't be using that method as it takes too long.

Method:1

Turn a cylinder between centres with a diameter just slightly larger than the intended finished diameter of the sphere, allowing length at both ends for two tenons.

Mark the middle and ends of what is to be the sphere.




tool through 90°.

Turn down the tenons to a small diameter.

Start turning away the edges of the cylinder containing the sphere by rolling over the







Turning the tenons down in order to get closer to the middle at both ends.

Use a skew chisel as a scraper to refine the shape. Your eye is good at detecting flaws.



Remove the piece and use two cup chucks to hold the partially finished sphere at 90° to what it was. Ron showed us a cup to fit over his live centre and another to fit into a scroll chuck.



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Cut off the tenons with a saw.

- Put the sphere between the cup chucks with the tenon remains perpendicular to the bed. (It is a good idea to use some non-slip draw mat in the cup chucks.)
- Turn away the tenon stubs and then refine the shape (not removing the centre pencil mark).
- Use a skew chisel as a scraper to refine the shape, changing its orientation several times.






Method 2:

This method uses a steel tube with a diameter slightly smaller than the resulting sphere (although it was noted that others have seen turners turning larger spheres with a smaller diameter tube).

Turn the timber into a cylinder a few mm larger than the desired diameter of the sphere.

Mark a line for scrap, another the desired diameter and a middle line mid way between the scrap and the diameter.





Turn tenons on both ends, one to fit in a chuck.

Mark as in the first method.

Hold the piece in a chuck and bring the tail stock up to the other end.

Start turning a sphere as in the previous method.

the pipe to round the end. Cut off the remaining tenon.

When close to a sphere, use the pipe to refine the shape, reducing the tenons in order to get close to the



centre of the spheres. Remove the tail tenon and use



Hold the piece in a jam chuck to remove the tenon nib. (Ron noted that there is not much to hold a sphere in a jam chuck so use sandpaper to do this, or be very light-handed with a chisel

June	Demonstrator George Pastuch <u>Natural edge bowl</u> Blank with/without bark attached. Preferably with hard bark intact. Maximum blank size—150mm dia x 70mm		
July	Demonstrator Ron Allen <u>Chalice</u> Blank. A section of any branch up to 150 dia and about 180 long. Preferably with hard bark intact. Green wood will be OK, in fact might be an advantage. Also bring superglue and activator if you have it.		
Augus	 bet Demonstrator Ron Allen <u>Potpourri Bowl.</u> A turning blank approx. 150 dia x 50 to 60 thick. A potpourri lid, available from Carbatec or online from Carrolls Crafts and others. These lids vary in diameter and you need to fit it to your potpourri. A round nose scraper or similar. Something robust would be good (bowl gouges as well). If you have a goose neck or other hollowing tool bring them as well. 		
Septer	 September Demonstrator George Pastuch <u>Ball/Sphere clock</u> Blank— 90mm long x 80mm dia. No knots. Any decorative timber 35 mm clock insert available from Carbatec or online from Carrolls Crafts and others. 		
Octob	October Demonstrator George Pastuch <u>Mushroom Box</u> Blank - 170mm long x 79 to 90mm dia branch with/without bark attached. Preferably with hard bark intact. Jam chuck process will be demonstrated		
Nover	nber Demonstrator Ron Allen <u>Involuted turning. A Christmas mystery project.</u> Ron will purchase and prepare timber and members can purchase same. (Inexpensive - probably less than \$2 each).
