Minutes of Northern Turners General Meeting May 24 2025

From the President;

Dave invited Robert Edge to report on the issue being experienced with the clubs "Square" payment system and the best way forward in remedying the problem. BOOK REVIEW

TURNING BOXES with Richard Raffan

Australian edition first published in 1998 by Thomas C Lothian Pty Ltd


Richard Raffan reveals the tricks you need to know when turning boxes, from the cutting and seasoning of the wood to finishing the piece.

Raffan takes you through the stages of turning a successful box in detail, showing ways a to overcome the pitfalls and problems. He assesses design options and offers a host of forms to get you started, as well as a gallery of boxes to inspire you.

Editors Note: A very concise book which goes into great detail explaining tools, turning equipment and cutting and the preparation of blanks. Raffin highlights his own method of back hollowing. This may look easy but a skill that takes a lot of practice. He also uses the skew for numerous cuts. Again a skill that requires practice and an acceptance to have catches until the required skill level is achieved.

In summary, a very comprehensive book on turning boxes. A *how to* manual that requires analyzing and interpreting by a new turner on their turning adventure, where as an experienced turner may skip the basics highlighted in this book.

Colin Slater showed a bowl of Tasmanian Murtle.

Dave Wills produced a cheese & Dave to Meats board, a plate made from camphor laurel, and a dimple-designed lidded box.

Hal Sneddon showed two very thin green-turned pistachio wood bowls.

Stuart Hunnisett showed a lamp from redgum wood that was diverted from an otherwise short life in a fireplace.

Graham Reed produced a large natural-edge pistachio wood bowl.

Something different from Tim Smeaton was a turned moulding blank and the small model boat it was used to make.

Peter Page showed a heavy pistachio wood bowl.

Tim Skilton showed a dissected whisky tumbler, useful for assessing the symmetry and thickness of the work.

Lindsay Winen showed a large natural-edge pistachio wood bowl, an avocado wood bowl with a drilled holes design, and a large Australian white cedar bowl.

Finally, Gavin Pink showed a bowl made from walnut wood.

Hal Sneddon was awarded the Halo for the month.



Trees 'n' Timber

Blackheart Sassafras

Southern Sassafras

(Atherosperma moschatum)

Not to be confused with Yellow Sassafras (Doryphora sassafras) from the coastal rain forests of Eastern Aust.

Derivation of names

Sassafras – probably after the Laurels (Sassafras spp) of North America, having similar fragrance.

Atherosperma from Greek 'athere' (goat) and, 'sperma' (seed) referring to the bearded carpels or fruit.

moschatum – from Greek 'moschos' referring to the odour of the bark.

The Tree.

A small to medium sized tree, 10 to 25m high. When young, the trees are usually well formed, somewhat conical in shape with straight trunks. Older trees usually have open crowns. The outer bark is thin and often covered with lichens, while the inner bark is thick and is aromatic. The leaves are small (to 1cm long and opposite. They are dark green above and whitish below. The leaves have a nutmeg fragrance. It has small flowers and fruit.



Habitat

Southern Sassafras is a widely distributed species in the cool temperate rain forests of Tasmania. There are also scattered distributions in the higher Sassafras Flower rainfall areas of Victoria and New South Wales.

Timber.

The sapwood is grey to pale brown. The heartwood is often darker with blackish streaks. This is the reason for its common name, Blackheart Sassafras, although during my research I could not find many references to this name. The grain is fairly straight, fine, even and smooth. It usually has no pronounced figure, although 'blackheart' provides streaks of striking and contrasting colour.

Southern Sassafras works easily and cleanly. It is a soft timber (490 to 529 kg/cu m), similar to radiata pine. It produces an excellent finish from a sharp plane, requiring very little sanding. It is an excellent timber for bending.

Blackheart Sassafras is much sought after for wood turning. It turns well, takes little sanding and produces a beautiful lustre with most finishes. Ron Allen



3rd Saturday Demonstration

George Pastuch—Winged Branch bowl

George began the session by explaining different methods to mount the blank on a lathe. His recommended methods were either a screw chuck with a hole drilled into the face, or a scrap piece of timber hot melt glued onto the face and a tenant turned to accommodate a scroll chuck Restrictions apply when using a mini lathe due to smaller swing over the bed.

George proceeded to turn the base. Initially turning the foot, then using a pull cut method turning away the waste under the wings while turning the underside of the bowl. Sanding the bowl is per normal process, however the



George explained that the shape of the wings either upswept, down swept. straight etc is up to the individual, and the process is the same. He then displayed a few examples of completed winged bowls.

Prior to these happening, members brought along bits and pieces for both the silent and normal auctions. Members also brought a variety of sweets to have during morning tea.


Tony Davies displayed some of his products to show people how tables are displayed at Northern Turner exhibitions. Well done Tony.
