Anne Kerr was awarded the Halo for the month.




BOOK REVIEW

USEFUL WOODTURNING PROJECTS

Guild of Master Craftsman Publication Ltd—1995

This is the second of a series of books drawing on articles from back issues of Woodturning magazines. There is a treasure trove of ideas, information and inspiration specifically designed for woodturners. Articles from talented, expert authors which have graced the pages of Woodturning magazine from the first issue in 1990. Included is advice and tips on basic techniques and projects to try in your workshop.

Editor's Note: There are 32 individual projects and/or techniques described in detail accompanied with photos. The majority of the projects would now be described as basic woodturning projects when compared to the wood art now being published in current magazines. However the techniques and basics of woodturning have not changed. For a woodturner starting on their discovery journey or the more experienced woodturner, the book is an interesting read.

3rd Saturday Demonstration

PENDANTS—Ron Allen

The usefulness of the spindle-mounted disc sander was shown when working on this type of project. A workshop to help members make their own sanding disk and table setup is currently being organised by Tim Skilton, Bill Elliott and Jeff Todd.



Ron then mounted an off-set jig, and the associated locating-pin jig, to produce the pendant. I understand that Ron will provide plans for this set of jigs at a later date.




The pre-drilled pendant blank is made up of contrasting dark and light wood, and attached to the jig using thin double-sided tape. Note

the use of a flat-ended live centre to hold down the pendant.



The pendant is then rounded off, and the outer edge is shaped and sanded.











The jig is then off set, and the inner edge is shaped and sanded. The pendant is finished with high gloss Hi-Tech (formerly Stylewood) using a soft brush (and diluted with 20% thinner) for a lasting shine.

NOTE: Gordon Best advised me that an eccentric chuck similar to Ron's which was fitted on a standard chuck in the space of two removed jaws called the "Dux chuck". It has the additional capability of being able to rotate the work piece to produce additional useful designs. There is an example in the Woodturning magazine 385.

4th Saturday demonstration Using the lathe as a grinder and polisher

Edward Noah

Eward started the demonstration with a discussion on the current project of using the lathe as a sanding attachment. This a project organised by Tim Skilton, Bill Elliot and Jeff Todd.





Edward further discussed the various uses of jigs that he has made both in his previous work requirements and his current hobby.

The majority of his jigs utilize threading a timber block onto the thread of the lathe header. This he has achieved by drilling the desired hole into a block of timber and then using a thread cutter, cutting the thread inside the block of timber. Using this as a base, he showed several examples where he has made jigs such as sanding drums, polishing wheels etc.







In addition he converted a cone similar to buffing centres to fit on the lathe.

Edward finalised his demonstration by graciously inviting members who wished to either further follow up on his jigs or make use of some to his work shop at home.

Trees 'n' Timber

Mallee

(Eucalyptus species)

Derivation of names

Eucalyptus from Greek 'eu', and 'kalyptos' meaning well covered and referring to the cap (operculum) which covers and protects the bud.

It is often said that **Mallee** is as Australian as is the kangaroo. It is uniquely Australian, having its origins as an Aboriginal word. The term 'Mallee' is commonly used to describe three different aspects. *First* is to describe a growth form of some eucalypts. *Secondly*, in reference to even height formations of scrub, and *thirdly*, describing a geographic area, eg. the Murray Mallee. These areas are usually associated with the wheat belt country having low rainfall.

The common names of several mallees can be misleading. There are several called red mallee and white mallee. The most common and widespread in South Australia are Red Mallee (*Euc. socialis*), White Mallee or Yorrell (*Euc. gracilis*), Oil Mallee (*Euc. oleosa*) and Narrow leaved Red Mallee (*Euc. foecunda*).

The Tree.

Although Mallee can grow to a tall erect tree to 10 metres high, it is usually a small multi-stemmed tree. As such, they have several small trunks growing from a swollen rootstock called a ligno-tuber. These ligno-tubers have the ability to regenerate new growth, even after serious damage by fire or drought. As such, mallee is almost indestructible, and many are thought to be up to 500 years old. In the past, these ligno-tubers were in great demand as mallee roots for firewood.

The tree is typically of an open form having several umbragious (umbrella shaped) crowns.

Habitat

Widely distributed over much of South Australia, central NSW, western Victoria, and southern Western Australia...

Timber.

The trees are too small to produce commercial timber, and the stems usually develop pipes from insect attack and heart rot. The timber is usually pale in colour, has a fine texture with close even grain. However, the trunks develop many burls, which provide beautiful colour and figure. These are much sought after for woodturning. The ligno tubers also provide beautiful timber. The grain in the ligno tubers and burls is tightly curled and usually can be worked and dried without undue splitting or cracking.
